

- √ 118 Wayne County Professionals trained
- √ 20,664 Total Screenings completed
- ✓ Developed new referral process to support children in foster care

Ages 0 to 5

- ➤ 5,472 screenings
- ➤62% disposition of referral for behavioral health services

Ages 6 to 20

- ➤ 15,192 screenings
- ➤ 64% disposition of referral for behavioral health services

Effective FY25 - New ICCW model

- ✓ Includes additional designations
- ✓ Developed new policies and procedures
- **✓** Advocacy for billable indirect services
- √ 35 ICCW Care Coordinators
- ✓ Total of 334 youth received ICCW services
- √ 10% increase of members received ICCW compared to FY24 (303)

Strengthening Families

Goal to offer an Evidenced Based Practice to support at risk youth and family focused

- ✓ Trained 5 Children Providers on the group therapy model for ages 3 to 16
 - ✓ Model involves the parent and child participation
- ✓ Plan to implement during FY26

- √ \$500 stipends and gifted labtops



Outcomes

Hospital Recidivism: Goal to remain below 15% of youth returning to the psychiatric hospital within 30 days of the previous hospital discharge.

- ✓ Remained below 15%
- ✓ Hospital recidivism = 12.64%
- ✓ Hosted a 2 half day Crisis Planning and Hospital Recidivism Training

School Based Health Quality Initiative

School Success Initiative: Children Providers are co-located in schools to offer prevention, therapy, and support to students, teachers and parents.

- ✓ 10 Children Providers 64 Schools
- ✓ 287 students successfully completed the program
- ✓ Reduction of crisis screenings and hospitalizations by 64 events compared to the previous year
- √ 1,225 Risk Factor Presentations

School Based Health Quality Initiative


GOAL Line: Providers in school behavioral health consultation and after school activities (Northwestern Activity Center)

- ✓ Expanded to offer after school support at local recreation centers and libraries




