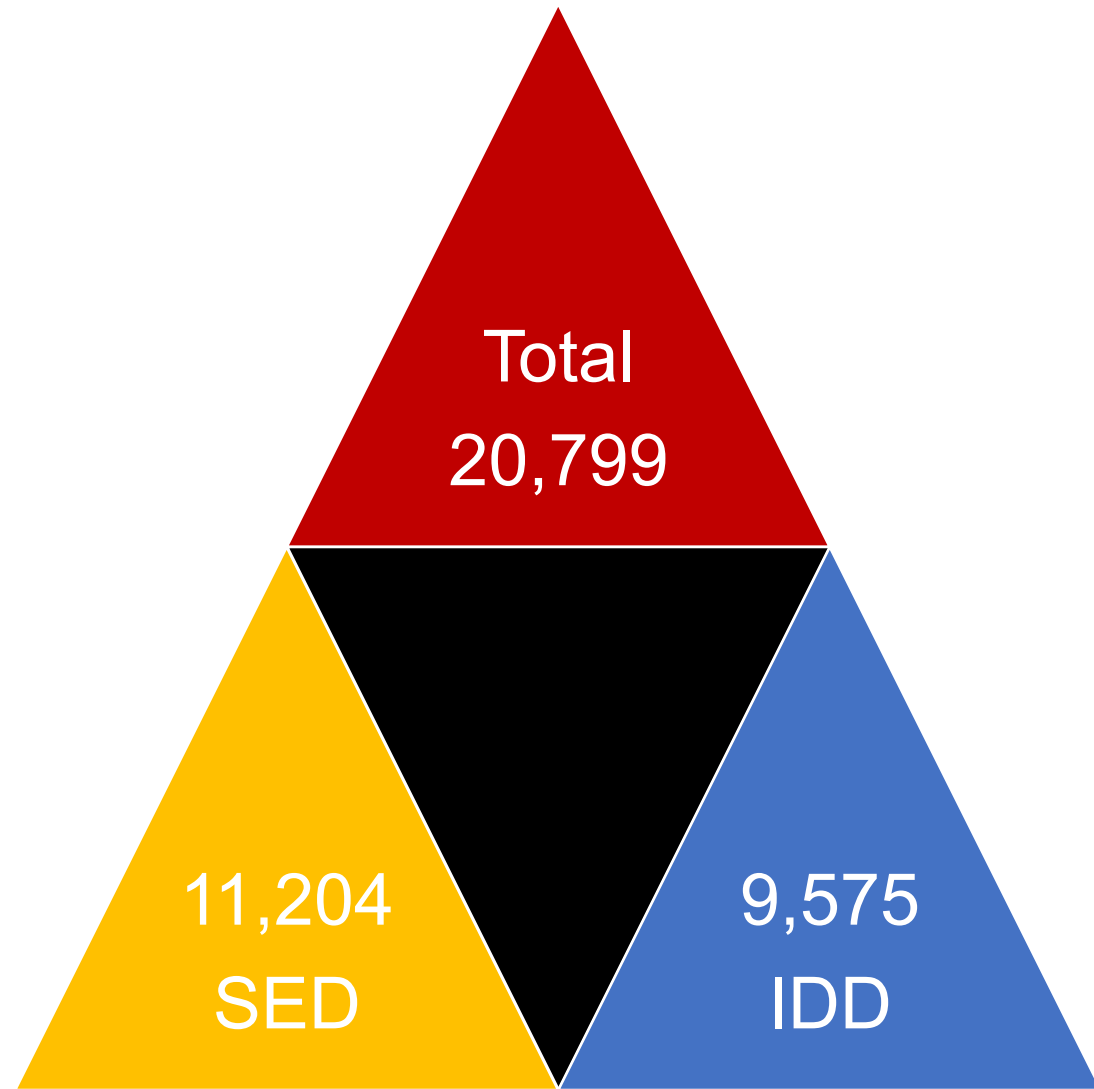

Effective FY25 – New requirement to launch the MichiCANS Screener and Comprehensive Assessment.

- ✓ **Hosted MichiCANS Q&A sessions**
- ✓ **118 Wayne County Professionals trained**
- ✓ **20,664 Total Screenings completed**
- ✓ **Developed new referral process to support children in foster care**

MichiCANS Screenings

Ages 0 to 5

- **5,472 screenings**
- **62% disposition of referral for behavioral health services**

Ages 6 to 20

- **15,192 screenings**
- **64% disposition of referral for behavioral health services**



NEW Initiatives

Intensive Care Coordination Wrap

Effective FY25 – New ICCW model

- ✓ Includes additional designations
- ✓ Developed new policies and procedures
- ✓ Advocacy for billable indirect services
- ✓ 35 ICCW Care Coordinators
- ✓ Total of 334 youth received ICCW services
- ✓ 10% increase of members received ICCW compared to FY24 (303)

Strengthening Families

Goal to offer an Evidenced Based Practice to support at risk youth and family focused

- ✓ Trained 5 Children Providers on the group therapy model for ages 3 to 16
- ✓ Model involves the parent and child participation
- ✓ Plan to implement during FY26



NEW Initiatives

Integrated Pediatric Health Program

Children Provider - Starfish

- ✓ Provide Behavioral Health Consultation for 6 OBGYN clinics
- ✓ Provided 327 screenings for pregnant mothers
- ✓ 89% were connected to behavioral health services

SEMPQIC

Partnership with Southeast Michigan Perinatal Quality Improvement Coalition

- ✓ 10 Professionals trained on postpartum depression screenings
- ✓ Marketing Campaign to increase perinatal awareness
- ✓ High Touch High Tech (HT2) E-Screenings

- ✓ ***Field Trip – Detroit Crime Lab***
- ✓ **\$500 stipends and gifted labtops**



Outcomes

Hospital Recidivism: Goal to remain below 15% of youth returning to the psychiatric hospital within 30 days of the previous hospital discharge.

- ✓ Remained below 15%
- ✓ Hospital recidivism = 12.64%
- ✓ Hosted a 2 half day Crisis Planning and Hospital Recidivism Training

School Based Health Quality Initiative

School Success Initiative: Children Providers are co-located in schools to offer prevention, therapy, and support to students, teachers and parents.

- ✓ 10 Children Providers – 64 Schools
- ✓ 287 students successfully completed the program
- ✓ Reduction of crisis screenings and hospitalizations by 64 events compared to the previous year
- ✓ 1,225 Risk Factor Presentations

Most prevalent – depression/anxiety and anger

School Based Health Quality Initiative

GOAL Line: Providers in school behavioral health consultation and after school activities (Northwestern Activity Center)

- ✓ 11 schools
- ✓ 375 students – GOAL Line after school program
- ✓ Expanded to offer after school support at local recreation centers and libraries
